

Choose a Purpose



Phase 2: Plan the Activity

Activity Levels

Each forum purpose has three corresponding activities from which to choose. The Key Concept, Community Building and Reflection categories are divided into Beginner Level, Intermediate Level and Advanced Level activities. The Critical Thinking category offers three Advanced Level activities due to the fact that thinking critically requires high level cognitive skills (as shown in the Overview table below).



Beginner Level – at this beginning level the student learns key terms and key concepts. Activities are basic, requiring low level thinking skills such as the ability to identify and classify information.

Intermediate Level – at this intermediate level the student learns to apply and analyze information. Activities require mid-level thinking skills such as the ability perform tasks and identify relationships between concepts.


Advanced Level - at this advanced level the student learns to synthesize information. Activities require high-level thinking skill such as the ability to evaluate and critique information. At this level, independent and original thinking occur.




